

From St Mark's House

Dear friends

I learned a new word today! The reason I learned it was because I have been wondering. (I do recommend wondering as one of my favourite activities. You can do it anytime, anywhere, it costs nothing, takes very little effort and almost always leaves you the better for it.) I was wondering about the magnificent magnolia in St Mark's House garden. It is



huge, its foliage dense and low and it is very wide as well as tall. I imagine it must be pretty old to be so established - but I'm no expert. When it blossoms, it is an eye-stoppingly gorgeous display that everyone comments on. It is as if a bit of heaven has landed in the garden. The blooms are stunning, large and pink and beautiful, and when they fall, they form a carpet of pale pink beneath (but not for long because the rabbits love to dine on them!). A few weeks later, after every bloom has gone and the tree is verdant green again, a second display begins! This is happening right now. There are not so many blooms, but being less of them means each is more significant. I look more closely at the spaced out flowers and discover their individual beauty. But what of my new word? It is 'remontant'. I've never heard this word before, but I imagine many green-fingered residents of Englefield have. It means blooming again or repeat blossoming. As I read on, the definition spoke of the blooming from 'old wood' after the new stems' blooms.

Many people here comment to me about their age, about slowing down, and feeling old. I wanted to tell you about the magnolia to encourage you to be inspired by it. As we age we may not still be full of the vibrant beauty of our first blooms and yet we are capable of later, more individually beautiful blossoming... even from old wood! And in fact, it seems that especially those plants that have been cut back, as we might feel we are, this very cutting back means that more blossoming can result. I want to encourage you to wonder about and discover the small and no less beautiful ways that you might 'bloom again'.

I also discovered that 'remontant' comes from the French mid 19th century verb 'remonter' which means coming up again. What a perfect word for this post-Easter season! It reminded me of the verses in Romans 6:

We were therefore buried with him through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly also be united with him in a resurrection like his."

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on Thursday 22nd May in Englefield Village Hall. The chairman, Edward Crookes, welcomed James Goodwin who joined the parish council in October 2024. Reports were given by Edward Crookes, clerk Nia Rands, Lynn Dennison on behalf of the Village Hall, James Meade on behalf of the Estate, and Rev Julia. District councillor Ross MacKinnon was unable to attend due to illness. The police report noted a very low crime rate over the past 12 months with just two incidents reported. The parish council reviewed seven planning applications over the year.

Grateful thanks were expressed to Nia Rands who is stepping down as clerk after many years of dedicated service.


Award for the Estate Yard

Congratulations to the Englefield Estate on winning a British Council for Offices award for the new Estate Office in the Yard. Englefield won Best Project up to 2,500m² in the South of England area. The citation noted: This pioneering project has transformed an historic, Grade II listed sawmill into a modern, energy-efficient office supporting local suppliers.



Combining natural materials and renewable energy systems, the project achieved an energy performance rating upgrade from G to A. Biophilic features, generous daylight access, and wildlife-supportive measures promote wellbeing and biodiversity. The judges applauded the building's balance of heritage conservation, community revitalisation and cutting-edge sustainability.

The project was delivered by the Estate with: quantity surveyor, Cole+; architects ADAM Architecture; interior designer Kitesgrove; M&E engineer WB Shiels; structural engineer RSA Design; contractor Stonewood Builders; and technology consultant Flux London. Congratulations to all concerned.



Summer concerts in the Park

The line up for this year's Heritage Live summer concerts at Englefield House is now complete. 
James Meade and James Menhenitt, Finance Committee and Governors

We need your help – please use water carefully

All being well, by the time you read this article we will have had a spell of plentiful rain. However, a very dry March and April, with significantly lower levels of rainfall compared to the long-term average, served as a reminder of our community's reliance on the Estate borehole to serve the majority of the parish.

We would gently remind everyone in the parish to use water as carefully as possible please. If we all save a little bit of water now, given the limits upon the volume that can be abstracted from the borehole, this could help avoid restrictions should there be a drought this summer. Advice on how to save water is available from various bodies such as <u>www.waterwise.org.uk</u> and <u>www.thameswater.co.uk</u>. In particular, we would please ask residents on the private water supply not to use sprinklers and to use hosepipes very sparingly whether washing cars or watering the garden.

Water is a precious commodity that cannot be taken for granted anywhere, but especially at Englefield. The Estate, as your water supplier, has a part to play too by dealing promptly with wastage or leaks in the distribution system. If you or one of your neighbours spots a leak, please report it immediately and we will repair it. Many thanks.

VE Day 80

Volunteers needed for Thyme Together!

The Thyme Together project is a friendly social group for seniors over 65, with a focus on activities that enhance health and wellbeing in a natural garden environment. It is an inclusive group which incorporates many aspects of therapeutic horticulture and is comprised of attendees who face a range of issues, from limited mobility, sensory impairment, to cognitive issues, and feelings of social isolation. We are looking for more volunteers who would enjoy assisting and supporting this group and encouraging social interaction. The volunteers are essential to the running of this group, as this allows the senior attendees to have the support that they need. Activities range from sitting down tasks for those with limited mobility, eg potting on, and weeding/planting in the raised beds, often from a chair, to more active jobs such as hoeing, for those without mobility issues. It is a friendly, gentle-paced gardening session which includes growing vegetables, flowers, fruit, outings, chat, tea and of course cake.

The current Thyme Together group is full and we have a waiting list of new people keen to join,' said Katie Andrews, session leader and horticultural therapist for the Thyme Together group which has just received a grant to fund and start up a second group. 'If anyone has two hours to spare on Thursday mornings to help volunteer with this new group, please do get in touch. It is a fantastic way to get out in a beautiful garden, meet new people and get involved in the local community.'

One of the current volunteers says, I love being at Five a Day Garden, it does me a power of good to be there. I love the rich soil and the wonderful vegetables and flowers we grow, and I get a great deal of pleasure from all the gardening jobs: planting out, composting, pruning, weeding and harvesting.

A meaningful connection

It seemed an obvious choice; sitting on a hillside on the Scottish Borders, a Highland cow with beautiful horns and a Blackface ewe with twin lambs at foot staring at me. I was twelve years old and my mind was made up, I would be a farmer. My background was dodgy as I was born in London and we were living near the centre of Glasgow. The impetus for this decision was that I wanted to do something useful in the world when then it was Chinese children starving, AND avoid the agony of a public transport commute which



my six-foot-four dad continually complained about, along with endless moans about his boss in BP Clyde Tanker Company.

When we graduated in Agriculture years later we worked on a large University farm and, guess what, after three years my daily complaint was about my boss. So with the chance to work for a family farming company, with a Christian in charge and in an area of outstanding natural beauty, we both jumped at it and came to Rushall Farm.

As part of their annual programme, the Bradfield Young Farmers would come to St Andrew's Church and celebrate Plough Sunday, when an old horse plough would be carried into the church. Rogation followed in better weather, always fun with a tractor and trailer ride around the farms asking God to bless the crops, livestock, the River Pang and our homes and families. Lammastide came in summer, when a sheaf of corn and loaf of bread made from the new season's wheat were brought into the church at the start of harvest. And then the big Harvest Festival when thanks was given that all had been safely gathered in.

With two new homes and barns on a fresh site at Rushall, as newcomers on the block we were offered first stop on the Rogation Service. They prayed for the farm and that those living and working here would be blessed and be a blessing to the community and the world we are here to serve. They were big prayers and really we had no idea what that would mean. So the bumpy ride started with times of great sadness, lots of mistakes but always thankful to be living here. After 40 years of running the farm, I did learn how to look after cows and sheep and grow wheat, barley and beans. BUT we could never have imagined, when we stood with shiny buildings and new houses all those years ago, the thousands of children and people who would come to have a meaningful connection with Rushall Farm.




From Englefield Primary School

'Sowing the Seeds for a Flourishing Future'

Just before the Easter break, we all had a truly wonderful experience on our whole school trip to Ufton Court. The younger children

learned about animals and their habitats whilst the older children learned about life in the Stone Age, having a go at creating sparks from a flint, spinning fleece into thread and building a wattle fence. The children listened well and participated with enthusiasm in all the activities.



We were then treated to some fabulous performances of the Year 3/4 production of *Porridge*. The children learned and performed their many funny lines brilliantly and sang with enthusiasm. A particular well done to Max, Alex and Evalyn for their touching solo singing.

Fifteen children entered the Team Kennet Cross Country held at Newbury Showground. With 1600 runners taking part and 52 schools, it was a massive event with a competitive field! The team embraced the experience and calmed the nerves, running with grit and determination over a bumpy and windy route cheered on by a huge crowd. As a team they came in third in Division 3 (for small schools) which was a brilliant achievement - well done runners! Individual achievements: Isla 7th,

Stanley 19th, Luca 29th and Max 32nd.

A huge well done to our Year 4/5 football team who won The Oratory Football Tournament, collecting gold medals after winning their four matches. They showed super team spirit and excellent teamwork, thanks to the brilliant leadership of Ben Fabianczyk, a parent and a coach at Pangbourne Football Club.



Recently it has been so lovely to walk outside at lunchtime to see everything that is going on. We are blessed with space so the children have plenty of room for play, both alone and with their friends. One aim of OPAL is to create more social spaces and more creative play. We have now added dressing up, small parts (such as gutters and crates which the children can build with), frames and fabric to create dens and more small world such as dinosaurs and LEGO. Our sandpit is nearly complete and the mud kitchen is going in over half term. OPAL playtimes are full of enterprise and creativity...and the tidying up is pretty impressive too!

Such developments are time-consuming and are almost impossible in a small school. We are blessed with an extremely supportive parent body who give up their time to help us out on our TLC Days. On the most recent one tyres were washed, the sandpit dug, built and lined, the pond area weeded and topped up with water, the hedge trimmed, the music wall moved (though it now has to move again!), the cobwebs removed, the loose parts sorted and spare bits tidied away. Thank you to our committed group of 'TLC-ers' who even include the Hawthorns, a family who no longer have a child at the school - great commitment!

Summertime at the Five A Day

It has been dry with some lovely sunny weather meaning we have been able to put our garden plans into place in a timely manner. The polytunnels have been given a good clean down courtesy of Vodafone's team day. Along with dahlias, early potatoes, leeks,

cucumbers and peas were planted in March. We are trialling asparagus but have to wait two years for the first crop! We have new soft fruit shrubs and, in the run up to

Easter established a new perennial flower bed. The rhubarb is doing well after a couple of years underperforming so we are glad to see it return. We also had funding for a new bench which is being installed shortly.

Volunteers: we sadly said goodbye to two volunteers as they either returned back to work or moved on to continue their good work in

their own gardens. Thank you to them for both their hard work. We have a new Trustee, Peter Haig, who brings wide experience and knowledge. Welcome Peter!

Corporate groups: four corporate groups have visited so far this year installing timber posts for fencing near the soft fruit, mending wobbly fence posts, spreading woodchip, painting the sheds and digging out old fruit bushes and strimming.

Schools and uniformed groups: Ella's Explorers continue to base their visits at Rushall Farm until November due to the road closure in Bradfield. Uniformed groups are now booking their 2025 visits and we look forward to seeing them very soon.

Thyme Together: the group had a tour around Theale Fire Station including being treated to tea and cake. The group have been busy preparing seedlings, cuttings, herbs, planting potatoes and planting soft fruit in the new fruit cage.




Workshops: we held two willow workshops in March and May offering sessions constructing plant obelisks and supports which were well attended. We are planning to run further workshops this year and are looking for volunteers who may be able to support us at weekends to help at the sessions. The Parish boundaries

We have now finished the compilation of an entirely new parish electoral roll. This is something that is done every sixth year for reasons that may seem obscure but are certainly connected with good housekeeping since the renewal provides an opportunity to start afresh and remove all those who have moved away or for some reason stopped regular attendance, which is a requirement for being on the roll.

This electoral roll is, of course, a completely different thing from the one used for local and parliamentary elections, being confined solely to votes in respect of church business. Unlike the other electoral roll, the church one is open to people from outside the parish, although the conditions are different for those living in the parish and those living outside, and the application form has different boxes to tick. This usually occasions a certain amount of confusion over whether one lives in the parish or not. This confusion arises because there are actually two separate parishes: the civil and the ecclesiastical, and their boundaries are far from being the same.

How this situation came about was dealt with in an earlier edition (April 2022) but suffice it to say for now the ecclesiastical parish was something of centuries standing when the civil parishes were created by parliament in 1894. Originally the two parishes were the same but while the ecclesiastical parish has remained fixed, the civil parish boundaries have in many cases been subject to great change.



The ecclesiastical parish of Englefield is much smaller than

the civil one now is and the reason our war memorial has only four names from the First World War is that those other men who died came from places associated with Englefield, indeed now in the civil parish, but then, and now, in other ecclesiastical parishes. The parish before 1894 – and still today as far as the church is concerned – is illustrated here. A colour version showing the adjoining parishes is at <u>https://www.englefieldhistory.net/the-village</u>.

In honour of Rogation Sunday (May 25th this year) we take a wander and beat the bounds of the parish shown here, also finding the old neighbouring parishes.

Starting at the top, Hogmoor Bridge on the Pangbourne Road, we follow first the River Pang and then the Bourne which also marks the boundary of the Old Deer Park ('Top Park') between the chalkpit and Common Hill. Crossing Common Hill we continue to follow the Bourne along the edge of the Englefield Common Wood, with Bournefield Farm to our right, as far as the first bridge over the Bourne where we turn left, cross the bridge and climb the steep track which will take us to Mayridge Hill Cottages. Leaving the cottages to our left we then descend the hill with the wood usually called Mayridge Wood today on our right. The wood is in fact called Ufton Wood on the OS Maps because all that land to our immediate right is actually in the parish of Ufton Richard. Now going down the other side of the hill called Mare Ridge in former times we meet the road running between Mayridge Farm and Lambdens Farm and turn left on it to Mayridge Farm. The boundary now runs across the field behind Mayridge Farm Cottages and then along the road to Bostock Lodges, leaving all the land on our right, including both farm and cottages, in the parish of Sulhamstead Bannister Upper End. Hence the two Nash brothers, killed in the First World War, are on the memorial at St Michael's in Sulhamstead. Sandwiched in between this bit of Sulhamstead Bannister and Ufton Richard is a piece of Sulhamstead Abbotts. Nowadays Abbotts and Bannister are combined as simply Sulhamstead and Ufton Richard is combined with Ufton Robert to form Ufton Nervet.

At Bostock we cross the Bath Road and the railway line to reach the Kennet and Avon Canal at the penlocks – the weir where the River Kennet diverges from the canal for a while. We follow the north bank of first the river past Draper's Osier Beds then a small offshoot all the way to Hayward's Farm and Station Road at Theale. The field on the other side of Station Road is actually in the parish as well but we will acknowledge that and walk up Station Road to the railway where we then turn left and follow the down line (more or less) back to Draper's Osier Beds.

So far the boundary has been easy to identify on the ground by natural or manmade features but from now on there is little in that way to guide us so our wanderings become somewhat approximate. From the Osier Beds the boundary follows a somewhat jagged path (along field edges originally) back to the Bath Road, striking it to the side of Gravel Pit Cottages. We cross the road and follow the hedgerow to the back of the gravel pit where we pick up the field edge and follow it in a straight line through the corner of the wood to the Bushy Wigmore crossroads where Common Hill meets the Pangbourne Road. From here the boundary follows the Pangbourne Road but with a couple of serious diversions.

The first diversion comes just before the Lodge Gates where the boundary bulges right a small way to incorporate Wickcroft Farm – but not the old Agency – and then right a bit more to incorporate a larger slab of land before returning to the Pangbourne Road just before the bottom of The Street. On either side of The Street some oak trees are shown as boundary markers on the 1883 map.

Just before the motorway the boundary turns right again for a short way to follow it and then incorporates a block of land between Piper's Lane and the motorway down as far as Malpas Farm. From Malpas the boundary heads back north, over the motorway and picks up Piper's Lane on the other side, which takes us back to Hogmoor Bridge. All the land to the east of Englefield was originally the parish of Tilehurst and that included North Street, though by the First World War Theale parish had been created so Arthur Hazell, Herbert Marshall and Herbert Parsons, all from North Street, are commemorated on the Theale memorial.

So, if you live within that boundary you are in the parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

Thoughts for the week

These reflections are just some of the short commentaries that are compiled by Aldo Guiducci each week on the readings in church. They are all available, week by week, on the pew sheets and on the church website.

'In my former book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus began to do and teach until the day he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles he had chosen' (Acts 1 v 1-2)

The book of Acts follows hot on the heels of Luke's Gospel, and is actually the second volume of Luke's account (between which our modern Bibles have inserted John like the filling of a sandwich). Because the two books are divided in this way, we can sometimes lose the continuity of the narrative that Luke wrote. That continuity is highlighted here in verse 1. Did you spot it?

Luke concludes his Gospel with the ascension of Jesus (Luke 24:51), and repeats it here at the opening of the book of Acts. Yet in verse 1, we read that in his Gospel Luke wrote about 'all that Jesus began to do and teach'. Far from saying that Jesus' actions and teaching were complete when he ascended into heaven, Luke is clear that his activity and teaching continue through his apostles who form and lead the early church. His saving work, the rescue mission he came to accomplish, was completed at the cross and vindicated through the resurrection, but that was not all he came to do. Acts picks up the story as, empowered by his Holy Spirit, the apostles set out to transform the society around them.

This point is important because it shows that Jesus is at work in the world even today. Since Pentecost (Acts 2), the gift of God's Holy Spirit has been poured out upon all those who believe in Jesus, enabling them to respond to his prompting and live transformed lives. When we read the Bible we can be confident that the Jesus we encounter there is not just a historical figure trapped in its pages, but is alive today and able to teach us and act in our lives by his Spirit right now. Jesus has a plan for our lives here in the 21st century, and equips us to follow it if we are willing. Have we grasped this truth, and are we living in the light of it?

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
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
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
